Principal's Message

Welcome to the final edition of our newsletter for Term 1 2020. How quickly the term has passed. My Principal's message in this edition will focus entirely on the operation of Richmond High School over the past few weeks and into the foreseeable future due to the COVID 19 situation. I would like to make it abundantly clear that there have been no identified cases of COVID 19 at Richmond High School. There are clear procedures in place if this were to occur that are managed by NSW Health and includes communication with our community.

I would like to thank our students, staff and community for supporting the school as the current situation has unfolded. Like the rest of the broader Australian community we have been advised on a daily basis of changes to the way we conduct ourselves and go about our daily lives. No one could have predicted the effect this advice was going to have on our lives and our school.

Wellbeing of All

Every decision that is made at a school level is based on maintaining the wellbeing of everybody who enters on to the school site. Students are our focus however I also need to ensure the wellbeing of staff and visitors when they are on site. This has not been made easy by the unusual and unnecessary purchasing of excessive amounts of hygiene products that has had a flow on effect to our school suppliers. As I write this article I can assure our community that we have orders in place and have sufficient supplies for the time being.

We have also been reminding all students of the hygiene practices that all in our community have been advised to follow. This includes the regular washing of hands, coughing or sneezing into our elbow, maintaining social distancing of at least 1.5 m and not sharing food or drink. If we do have students that are not following this it is not for a lack of education.

Communications

I have updated our community through our usual channels as we receive advice from the Department of Education. When the Prime Minister makes an announcement this has a flow on effect to State Premiers, the Department of Education and then to schools. I can only provide advice once I have information from our School Operations Directorate. Some of this information is changing as new decisions are made at various levels. I will continue to provide the Richmond High School Community with updates as they become available.

Student Attendance

One are that has been changing is the advice regarding student attendance. At this time students who have been directed to self-isolate or whose parents have follow the advice not to send them to school as of 24 March 2020 will be marked as being on Flexible Leave. This means that the absences will not count towards the students overall attendance.

Any other leave will be recorded as per usual reasons of Absent Sick or Absent Leave. For Semester 1 reporting of absences and for Attendance Awards I have made the decision not to include absences during the time that students have not been required to attend and have engaged in learning at home.

On Line Learning

In 2017 Richmond High School made the decision to prepare for on line learning. Throughout 2018 my staff undertook extensive professional learning to prepare for the use of Google Classroom and Google Sites to enable students to access their learning on line. In 2019 Year 7 were our first year of our BYOD program and in 2020 this has continued with Year 7 and 8. This year we have encourage students to bring a device in Years 11 and 12 and all teachers have a Google Classroom that students have access to. There are many teachers who also utilise Google Classroom in Years 9 and 10.







With the announcement that learning both at home and at school will be on line Richmond High School was in a good position to take on this challenge. We acknowledge that there are some students who do not have the same level of access to technology or internet access at home and we have made hard copies of the on line work available to be mailed or collected from the office.

Teachers are currently producing more lessons to go online and monitoring student work completion at home. While at some time in the future all students will be expected to return to school the use of on line learning will continue to be a focus at Richmond High School.

Visitors to the School

The advice we have is to limit movement to and from the school site. This includes having visitors to the school as well as parents/carers. Please do not come onto the school site unless you have made a prior arrangement. Communication is preferable over the phone or via email. We have and will continue to limit the number of deliveries or maintenance contractors onto our site.

The End of Term 1 2020

As we approach the end of Term I again thank our staff who have been outstanding in their support of students and the community. I would especially like to thank Ms Beth Middleton, Ms Sheridan Parsons and Ms Jo Gibbs for their work in preparing the school for online learning before and during the COVID 19 situation.

I wish all of our students and families a Happy and Safe Easter in isolation. As we have been told the effect of COVID 19 around the world will be long lasting. Within our community if we work together the outcomes for everyone will be improved and positive.



Monitoring Online Learning


Our students should be now engaged in online learning through their Google Classrooms and other online platforms. Parents and carers can check their child's progress in each of their individual subject Google Classrooms, by asking your child to show you their online classroom for each subject (eg. English, Maths or Science). Then have them click on the CLASSWORK tab at the top and click on the VIEW YOUR WORK option (Slide 1).

Google Classroom: check your child's progress



This will then LIST the tasks ASSIGNED and show what has been completed and what has not (it will still say ASSIGNED). If you click on each individual TASK you will see what they have done for yourself (Slide 2) - just because a task has been TURNED IN does not necessarily mean it has been completed. Your child's teacher will be monitoring their progress and providing feedback online for individual tasks, just as they would if it was face-to-face learning.

Progress Reports & Year 12 Reports


All Year 7 & 11 students should have received Interim Reports via mail by the end of this week. This is the fifth year that we have provided some information to parents and carers regarding Year 7 students progress, and this is the second year we have extended that from just their core subjects (English, Maths, Science, History or Geography, PDHPE, Music or Language) to now include their more practical subjects (VA, Ag, D&T, Food & Wood). Students will be given a rating out of 5 (5-High to 1-Low) for Effort and another rating for Behaviour. This will give you an early indication of how your child has settled into high school.

The "honeymoon" period is definitely over for our Year 11 cohort as they begin their Preliminary HSC as senior students, and they are currently completing their first assessment tasks in most courses. Their Progress Reports will give parents and carers an early indication of how they are adapting to senior school and the demands of senior courses. We continue to encourage ALL students to focus on their EFFORT and ensuring that they are doing what is required to achieve a '5' from their teachers for effort on their reports. We have told them that if they are a five for effort (100% effort), they cannot do any more than that, and that if they are putting in 100%, "everything else will take care of itself". Year 11 have been told that the ONE thing they can always control is the effort they put into their school work.





Year 12 are now almost half way through their HSC courses, having begun in Term 4 last year, and their Semester 1 Reports are currently being finalised by staff. We were intending on distributing them in Week 11, when students would have completed their last Report Reflection. However, with the majority of students working from home, we will mail reports out before the end of the term. They should be reading them diligently, implementing any advice on offer from their teachers, so they know where their focus needs to be in Terms 2 & 3 as they approach their HSC.



Year 10

Next term when students return to attending school every day, we will be meeting with Year 10 to outline our expectations for the year group in regards to their academic progress in working towards their Year 10 Record of School Achievement (RoSA) grades; their presentation at school in regards to their uniform; and their behaviour as safe respectful learners at Richmond High School. There will be a minimum expectation that will need to be achieved to receive an invitation to their Year 10 Formal at the end of the year. More information will be provided at the beginning of next term, including a letter to parents and carers about the minimum requirements.

Uniform: "Be In It"

In Term 2 our PBL focus will shift from "Silent & Out of Sight" in regards to students use of their mobile phones in the classroom, to students wearing full school uniform each day - **Uniform: Be In It**.

Richmond High School is a uniform school and our expectation is that students will wear their school uniform each day, not only demonstrating respect for themselves but also their school. The **safety** of our students is paramount to our everyday operations and it

is also one of our core values. Students wearing school uniform makes it very for both the permanent and casual staff very simple to identify any intruders on school grounds, so that we can quickly act if necessary. Uniform expectations for both our senior and junior students is displayed below:



Please Note ALL Years:

- NO tracksuit pants, tights, leggings, denim jeans or sports shorts.
- School REPRESENTATIVE tops or jackets that are predominantly NAVY may be worn; eg. Macquarie Zone tops.
- PLAIN maroon (juniors) or navy (seniors) tops may be worn in-lieu-of or to provide additional warmth in the cooler months approaching.

Mrs Cullen and I will continue to work with home room teachers and year supervisors to identify students who are repeatedly out of uniform without a note from home. Consequences will be issued to students who do not meet our uniform expectations consistently. If there are financial limitations preventing you from purchasing the appropriate uniform, please contact Mrs Cullen (years 7, 9 & 11) or myself (years 8, 10 & 12) and we are more than willing to work with you in assisting on meet your child's uniform needs.

2020 HSC is going ahead



A media release from the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA).

24 March 2020

At its meeting today, the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) Board confirmed that the Higher School Certificate (HSC) is going ahead in 2020, along with a commitment to providing clear and regular advice to the community about the HSC as the COVID-19 outbreak continues.

To this end, the NESA Board established a COVID-19 Response Committee to address developing issues as a matter of urgency.

Following the meeting, Chair of the NESA Board Professor Peter Shergold said he had three important messages for HSC students:

We know you are worried. While we recognise we are facing an unprecedented situation, we want to assure you that you will be able to get a HSC certificate this year, and that the certificate will facilitate access to university, further education and employment, as it has for students over the past 50 years.

Keep learning, do your assessments as advised by your school, make progress on your major projects where you can and, most importantly, look after yourself, whether you are at school or at home. Reach out to family, friends and your teachers if you need to.

If you get sick, your school and NESA have provisions to ensure you are not disadvantaged.

Effective immediately the Board is giving principals or system authorities the power to make decisions about the number and weighting of HSC formal assessment tasks for their school in 2020. The Board affirms its complete trust in principals and teachers.

"This action provides schools with the flexibility they need to support their students in the context of the COVID-19 outbreak," Professor Shergold said.

NESA will provide specific advice to principals about this delegation of authority later this week.

The NESA COVID-19 Response Committee is aware of and will urgently provide advice on the following issues:

- work placements for VET students
- students working on a group drama, dance or music performance
- students completing projects and major works.

Professor Shergold said the situation faced by schools was unprecedented and that in this situation the Board recognises above all else that the health, safety and welfare of students and teachers is paramount.

"The Board discussed at length issues of disadvantage, dislocation and social isolation.

"Decisions and advice will be based on the principles of fairness and equity that have always underpinned the internationally recognised HSC credential," Professor Shergold said.

The COVID-19 Response Committee includes representation from each of the three school sectors who are committed to working together. It will meet at least weekly, but more frequently if needed, to address issues as they arise and provide clear communication to schools and principals. The committee members include:

- Paul Martin CEO of NESA.

Richmond Applied Digital Skills

This Year, Richmond High School will be trialling the "Richmond Applied Digital Skills Program" using the Google Education free project-based video curriculum.

This program will give students the opportunity to further develop their Digital Literacy and Digital Citizenship. Students can access Applied Digital skills from their BYOD and can move at their own pace.

Students will get access to engaging, ready-to-use video lessons in order to gain invaluable skills that prepare them for problem solving in a digital world.

Some of the lessons include:

- Organize Files in Drive Learn how to store, access, and share documents, presentations, forms, and photos in the cloud.
- **Create a Resume in Google Docs** Design, write, and format a professional resume that stands out.
- Understand Your Digital Footprint Visualize your digital footprint by recording your online actions in a spreadsheet.
- Avoid Online Scams Learn to identify and avoid online scams by analyzing a real-life situation in a group.

Students will also be able to received Completion Certificates as they complete lessons.




In Classwork, CLICK on the assigned task




Investigating the Past

NSW All School Triathlon

The 2020 Relay Triathlon was held on a beautiful sunny day with over 2,500 students participating that day.



This year Richmond High School was represented by a record number of teams (33 students) competing in the annual NSW All Schools Triathlon. This is a state-wide event which was held at Penrith Regatta Centre on Thursday 27th February. For half of our teams it was their first time tackling the three tiered event but they were brave and adventurous in spirit. Many of our teams were Year 7 students who had only known each other for a few weeks and they were racing against schools from up and down the coast all over the state.

In addition, this year we had a solo entrant, **Nicholas C** (Year 8) representing Richmond High School in his first Individual Triathlon Race. We were bowled over by his tenacity as he pushed himself through a day full of drama to gain a position of 50th in the State for Government schools. Well done!





The swimming course was relocated to a different section of the Lake, as recent floods had affected conditions in its usual starting point. Our students gathered along the grassy shores, running along the wooden jetty and plunging into the murky waters beneath, treading water while waiting for the siren to blare. Then off they surged into a flurry of white-water

frenzy, arms flailing, legs thrashing, trying to aim for the floating white buoy as they scrambled ashore, running with wobbly legs up the roadway to tag their waiting cyclists. Helmets snapped tight, bikes yanked off the transition racks, cyclists mounted their bikes, shifting their weight till gears kicked in and up and over the main bridge to begin the first 5 km lap. Juniors completing 10km and Intermediates completing 15 km.





Waiting back in transition as the heat and glaring sun built up, were the last of our teams, the runners; stretching and flexing before their team cyclists came whirring into transition, tagging the runners who then sprinted off into the distance. Back in the Grandstand we sat on the edge of our seats in anticipation, peering into the hazy glare, looking for our Richmond High runners to bring the team home, cheering loudly as they pushed past others in the last few metres to clock a great time under the big blue inflatable finish line.




